Dr. Jean Clinton is a Clinical Professor, Department of Psychiatry and Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster, division of Child Psychiatry. She is on staff at McMaster Children's Hospital with cross appointments in Pediatrics and Family Medicine, and an Associate in the Department of Child Psychiatry, University of Toronto and Sick Children's Hospital. She is also a senior scientist at the INCH (Infant Child Health) Lab at McMaster University. In addition she is a Fellow of the Child Trauma Academy. She has been a consultant to children and youth mental health programs, child welfare, and primary care for almost 30 years. Dr. Clinton was recently appointed as an education advisor to the Premier of Ontario and the Minister of Education.

Dr. Clinton is renowned locally, provincially, nationally, and more recently internationally as an advocate for children's issues. Her special interest lies in brain development, and the crucial role relationships and connectedness play therein. Jean champions the development of a national, comprehensive child well-being strategy including a system of early learning and care for all young children and their families. B is for Bullying... or is it Behaviour??? - This session highlights evidence-based theory on the functions of behaviour; how behaviour becomes bullying; how children learn bullying behaviour; why children engage in bullying behaviour; and strategies for the prevention of bullying in young children. Participants will enjoy an interactive group atmosphere while working through scenarios, viewing video clips, and further exploring the concepts of empathy development, types of aggressive behaviour, and the differences between mean behaviour and simply... being rude!

Saturday October 14th - Dr. Jean Clinton

- **Keynote:** The First R Relationships: The Importance of Connection This presentation explores the developing brain and the crucial role relationships with others play in healthy development. In the past decade, and more, the role of the environment, both physical and emotional has led to a deeper understanding of what young children need in the early years to thrive. Relationships that are warm, responsive, and predictable help our children thrive, relationships generate intense stress can harm the developing brain. This presentation presents the science in a very accessible.
- **Workshop:** This workshop will take a deeper look at social and emotional learning in the Early Years with a focus on attachment and temperament.

- Session 1A/2A (full afternoon) Julie Newhook Children's Gender Diversity: Beyond the Myths In the second half of the workshop, Dr. Temple Newhook will be joined by Trans Youth Group facilitators, Mr. Tj Jones and Ms. Sara Pinsent, for a guided discussion with a question and answer session.

Information for parents and educators on the effects of screen media provide mixed messages. As young children's exposure is quite high, there is concern that time spent with screens might replace other learning activities such as reading, play, and social and language interactions. There is also worry that too much screen time might be harmful to children's developing attention and self-regulation.

Sunday October 15th - Christine McLean

- **Keynote:** Reflect? I don't even have time to think! There's a lot of talk lately about being a reflective practitioner. What does this mean, exactly, and how does a busy ECE find time to practice reflection on top of everything else? Christine will talk about why reflection is important and how to build time in an already busy day/week/month to encourage and support reflective practice in an early learning environment.
- Workshop: Play, play-based curriculum and play-based learning are they the same thing? Are they different? And why does it matter? - The terms 'play', 'play-based learning' and 'play-based curriculum' seem to be interchangeable, however, there are some important differences. During this workshop, participants will explore their roles as educators who facilitate play and play-based learning while implementing a play-based curriculum.
